The President's Perch

An article in a recent issue of National Wildlife magazine cites a study at the University of Illinois in which third graders at a Midwestern elementary school are "significantly more attentive and engaged in their indoor studies following a 40-minute lesson conducted outdoors in a natural setting." Such refueling in nature according to the researchers allowed the students' teachers to teach their students uninterrupted for almost twice as long as would have been possible if the students never left the classroom.

The results from the study in the Midwest suggest that outdoor lessons may be an inexpensive way to improve student engagement in learning. Last year the local charter school, Acadia Academy asked if they could use Thorncrag as an outdoor classroom as they have no green space on their campus and we readily agreed. This relationship with Acadia has continued as we helped teach a three week pollinator class for students at the Academy this summer.

Education had been a cornerstone of the Bird Club's mission for 100 years and will hopefully remain important for the next 100 years.



BYLAW CHANGES

The Stanton Bird Club, as with many non-profits across the county has struggled to maintain a full Board complement as required by the bylaws of the Club. The last time the Board had full membership was over 10 years ago. The Board membership is very active but is recommending that we change the by-laws to more accurately reflect the number of members we have been able to maintain from 14 members to 11 members. See the change recommended below. We will be asking the membership to vote on this change at the Annual Meeting:

Article IV. Government

Section 1: The governing body of this corporation shall consist of a Board of eleven members of the corporation. The tenure of office of the Directors shall be two years, at most only six Directors' terms can expire in any one year. Therefore at each annual meeting of the corporation, six members shall be elected to a new term by ballot of a majority of the members present in one year and five members shall be elected in the alternate year; due notice having been given in advance to all members.

Article VI. Meetings

Section 5: Meetings of the Board of Directors may be held at such times as may be designated by the President. Six members shall constitute a quorum.
