

### **GUIDED BIRD WALKS**

#### SPRING / SUMMER 2023

Anyone interested in walking, seeing new places, fresh air, and nature is welcomed. Walks are held in a variety of interesting and diverse local habitats, plus some areas less often visited. Please mark your calendar and join us on the Wednesdays listed, or pick and choose those which most interest you.

- Meet at the boat launch parking lot, corner of Frost Hill Ave. and Rt. 196, Lisbon May 17 Schott Preserve, Greene — Meet at the Schott home, 303 South River Road, Greene; the last home at end of the road after road becomes gravel, drive up the driveway to park.
- May 24 Brunswick Landing Perimeter Trail, Pine Street Entrance Meet at the end of Pine St., Brunswick near St. John's Cemetery.
- May 31 Androscoggin River Trail, Lisbon Meet at the parking lot for the Papermill Trail and boat launch, Rt. 196 at Frost Hill Ave.
- June 7 Whitman Spring Road, Auburn starting at south end (before West Auburn) Meet at the trail, where Spring Rd. dead ends, turn just beyond Summer St.
- June 14
   Riverside Trail, Lewiston

   Meet at the corner of Winter and Whipple Sts. in Lewiston at Sunnyside Park

   June 28
   Fitzgerald Preserve, Brunswick
  - Meet on the entrance road, Lindbergh Landing (Lindbergh Crossing) off the Old Bath Rd.
- July 12 Marden-Chittick Refuge, Greene Meet at Judy Marden's home, 196 North Mountain Rd., Greene; the last house after road turns to gravel. Park on the side of the road.
- July 26 Penny Jesup & David Chittim's home, Lewiston Meet at their home, 28 No Name Pond Road, Lewiston. We will park on the lawn.

Meeting Locations, as noted above, meet at the walk location. Reservations are not required.

- All walks start at 8AM at the walk location. Walks end by 11AM, but you may leave early.
- Walks will be held even if it is drizzling, but if there is a steady rain at 7AM and projected to continue past 9AM, the walk is canceled.
- · Walks are approximately 2 miles on a generally even and basically dry surface.
- · Bring binoculars and dress for the weather, layers work very well.

#### Christmas Bird Count 2022 Saturday, December 31, 2022

The Stanton Bird Club conducted its 43rd Christmas Bird Count of the Lewiston and Auburn area on Saturday, December 31<sup>st</sup>. In total, 19 people participated (includes 1 feeder watcher) and recorded 50 species; the average since 2000 is 48. There was no snow on the ground and most moving waterways were open (Sabattus pond was frozen). The grand total of 9,166 individual birds was a new count high for individuals, and well above the average of 5,580. The weather was mostly cloudy all day. There was little/no wind and temperatures started at 34 degrees, rising to 54 by the end of the day. Count week added no additional species. There were no new bird species added to the count this year.

New Highs: American Crow

Low Counts: Common Goldeneye, Blue Jay, Black-capped Chickadee, Cedar Waxwing, Dark-eyed Junco

Above Average: Mallard, Wild Turkey, Red-tailed Hawk, Rock Dove, Mourning Dove, Tufted Titmouse, White-breasted Nuthatch, European Starlings, American Robin, House Sparrow, House Finch, Northerm Cardinal

Irruptive: Pine Siskin, Purple Finch, Evening Grosbeak, Pine Grosbeak

**Trending:** Red-bellied Woodpeckers were seen for the 12th consecutive year and Eastern Bluebirds have become more reliable winter residents this past decade. Peregrine Falcons have continued on the spires of the Gendron Franco Center (old St. Mary's church).

Notables: A Great Blue Heron was flying by the North bridge between Lewiston/Auburn, while an Iceland Gull was seen on ice north of the Androscoggin falls. The Merlin was spotted flying over the Hilton Garden Inn in Auburn. A single Evening Grosbeak was with a flock of robins at St Peters Cemetery in Lewiston. A Northern Flicker and Carolina Wren were heard in the Valley St neighborhood in Lewiston. A Muscovy (likely escaped domestic) was spotted at the Auburn riverwalk.
